1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. Thakur Ranmat Singh College, Rewa is one of the reputed and oldest institutions imparting higher education in Madhya Pradesh, committed towards academic excellence, Research and innovation. The New building for the college was constructed at National Highway 7 in October 1938. In 1944, several graduation courses were started in the College, and the college was elevated to a degree status. On August 15, 1957 the College was renamed as Thakur Ranmat Singh Postgraduate College. Since 1968 the College is affiliated with Awadhesh Pratap Singh University Rewa.

- Eminent and well educated and committed faculty dedicated to Teaching, learning, Research and innovation
- Efficient and vibrant human resource reflected in 11347 Student Enrolments integrating **Distance Learning Centers of MP Bhoj University, SWAYAM and NPTEL for enriching capacity building options.**
- Research Facilities focused on Multi-disciplinary Research- the college is a recognized center for research in 12 disciplines in arts and social science focused on multi-disciplinary research. Apart from Research centers in Arts and social science all the regular science faculty are research supervisors committed towards multidisciplinary Research activities.

Institutional Weakness

- **Student- Faculty Ratio-** Increased pressure of Students adversely influences student teacher ratio as per UGC norms.
- **Computer-Student ratio-** Need of more computer labs in ratio of students and research scholars enrolled in the Institution.
- **Research and innovation in Science Faculty-** The college needs to be recognized as center of research in science. The Institution needs to be elevated in Post graduate College in Science by the Department of Higher education. PG courses run in the college are self-financed that is a major hurdle for the institute being recognized as center of Research in Science.
- **Integrated Research laboratory** for Science Departments is a requirement for research and innovation in science
- **E-content development, media center, LMS and LCS facility-** Lack of resources hinders the development of adequate media center to facilitate e-content development and MOOCS of It's own.
- **Rural background of the students-** More vocational courses may be opened giving opportunity to students of rural background for self-employment opportunities in agricultural and rural sector.
- **Hostel Facility for Boys and Girl's-** Hostel facility is a major requirement for boys and girls from remote places to smooth study. The facility existing in the Institute is not sufficient enough to accommodate boys and girls from remote places in need of accommodation.
- **Patents are lacking** in the Institution due to meagre opportunities of research in faculty of science at the institutional level.
- **Research Consultancy-** More consultancy is required

Institutional Opportunity

A number of opportunities are there to capitalize by the students-

- **Better Human resource** in view of the large no. of Enrolments and Ph.D. Scholars. Such a human resource can be harnessed into a worthwhile employable pool by associating in the initiatives of the Government such as Atm Nirbhar Madhya Pradesh, Atmnirbhar Bharat, Viksit Bharat, Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat,
- **Opportunities in Career and Placement-** Institutional-Industry linkage can help Students can capitalize opportunities of employment, **self-employment through career and placement initiatives of the Swami Vivekanand Career and placement cell.** At the Local level there are industries such as **Vindhya Tele links, Prizm Cement, Ultra trek cement, Virla Cement, Maihar Cement, Jaypee cement, food and craft Institute Rewa.** The students having skill and knowledge encash the opportunities existing at local level.
- **Better Institution- Community linkage**
- **Self-Employment and Entrepreneurship-** A large no. of Students opt Commerce and Students from Rural Background can be motivated for opportunities of **Self Employment in agricultural sector, bee keeping and honey production, Dairy Farming.** Value added training courses are organized in the students according to their vocational aptitude. **A few students of the college have got engaged in Mushroom Cultivation, Dairy Farming, Bee-keeping and Honey Production.**

Curricular Aspects

Outcome-based curriculum

Apart from various Skill enhancement Courses (SEC), and wide range of “value-added” courses are introduced. The College is a local Chapter of SWAYAM and the students are motivated to opt courses available on SWAYAM.

NET or JRF. *80% faculty members are Ph.D.* guides with an average of 15 years of experience in research supervision. The faculty of the College are encouraged to attend FDP's, Induction programs, Training Courses including teacher's training programs to learn and keep abreast the latest developments in pedagogy.

The focus of the institution is to ensure quality input in the curriculum to enable the students towards quality learning. The college had opted 57 programs with 889 courses prior to the implementation of CBCS program. The institution has introduced NEP courses on CBCS pattern in compliance with National Educational Policy 2020 intending to focus outcome-based learning, reflected in **Program outcomes, Program Specific outcomes and course learning outcomes**. The curriculum of the Institution is guided by Ordinance 14 'A' of Department of Higher education Madhya Pradesh with autonomy to revise update upto 20% of the curriculum existing.

A number of Elective courses have been introduced giving broader choice options. The college runs 29 Vocational Courses to suit the skill and aptitude of the students.

Computer learning and updated knowledge is essential ingredient of not only quality education but also of the competence building in accordance with the need of global society. The College provides facilities for computer learning, entrepreneurship, and environmental studies to the students at graduate level who are at the formative stage of learning. The courses are of relevance to the current needs of the society. BCA, B.Com C.A., B.B.A., B.Sc. Bio-technology at UG level, M.Sc. Bio-technology, M.Sc. Bio-Chemistry, M.Sc., Micro-biology, MSW, have direct bearing of skill, employability, entrepreneurship and innovation.

The College convenes the meetings of the 'Board of Studies' to review and amend the syllabus as required in accordance with the needs of the current developments at the very commencement of the session. The suggestions of the Board of Studies is complied with before submission for approval of Academic Council. The College ensures the involvement of industry, Research bodies and civil society, alumni and other stakeholders by nominating them in the Board of Studies and Academic Councils. The meeting of Academic Council is convened every year to approve the curriculum and changes recommended by the 'Board of Studies'. The suggestion of Stake holders, students, alumni, academia and industry is acknowledged and given space in the curriculum.

The curriculum integrates ICT, and skill-based contents in the core courses as well as foundation courses opted at graduation and post-graduation level. Several self-finance courses have been introduced in the college integrating to employability, entrepreneurship, innovation. The foundation courses are introduced

for the students of all the streams B.Sc., B.COM, B.A., BBA, BCA, to meet the aptitude and skill of the students. The curricula for the self-financing schemes are designed in accordance with the University ordinance. The Curriculum introduced are in tune with the realization of sustainable development goals included under 17 UNSDG goals.

Research-

The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes to cater to differential learning needs of the student

Response:

The College has devised mechanism to assess the learning levels of advanced learners and slow learners

and the process starts with the notification of admission by the department of higher education.

STUDENTS COUNSELING- Conducted to counsel the students on choice of the courses according to aptitude and interest of the students.

ZERO CLASSES- Held at beginning of regular classes to get students introduced with the functioning of the institution, student's code of ethics.

INDUCTION PROGRAMS- Organized for the students to make them aware of the student support facilities, provided to the students, procedures of Assessment, evaluation, examination system, NCC, NSS, Redcross and extension activities conducted.

ASSESSMENT- The College applies Summative and formative assessments to assess the learning level of advanced and slow learners. An informal need analysis is conducted to meet with the special requirements of the Advanced and Slow learners. The Departments are expected to prepare a tentative list of advanced and poor learners, and organize the initiatives required to address the issues regarding teaching and learning.

Assessment System

Summative assessment -the college applies techniques to analyses the creative skills, writing Skills, evaluation, self-assessment and analytical skills.

formative assessment- the methods applied to assess the learning needs of Slow and Advanced Learners are-

Comprehensive constant evaluation:

- Periodic assessment of the students is conducted through CCE tests in each semester for UG students to assess the performance of the students of different categories. 03 best of 04 tests are mandatory for the students. CCE is a part of Semester assessment. The slow learners are motivated through individualized instruction and remedial measures, extra classes and Personal Counseling. CCE helps to assess unit wise preparation of the students. 04 CCE were conducted in each semester prior to the implementation of CBCS under NEP. The marks obtained by the students are added in the semester results. After the implementation of NEP two tests are conducted in each semester.
- **Assignments-** Assignments are given to the students in each semester.
 - In-house Projects are assigned to the students in VI semester at UG level & IV semester At PG level. Field projects are assigned to the students of BBA, B. Com (CA), BCA, Bio-Technology, Bio-Chemistry, Micro-biology, Zoology and MSW.
 - Group discussion, quizzes, Surprise tests, peer- teaching are some of the methods applied to assess the performance of the students.
 - The student's learning outcomes are monitored through their performance in the CCE's.
- **Seminar-**Class room seminars are conducted on weekends in which selected number of students present papers on topics allotted to them. This is helpful in tracking the poor performers.

Integrated seminars were organized at the semester end for PG and M.Phil students prior to implementation of NEP. In the Ist session of the date of integrated seminar departmental presentations

are held. In the IInd session, the best adjudged presentation from each department were presented in the auditorium. The best adjudged presentation is awarded with certificate of excellence and a certain amount in every semester. Remedial classes and extra classes are held for poor learners as required.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experience and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

The College follows Student centric pedagogy on the pattern of Bloom's Taxonomy' (knowledge, Comprehension, Application, Analysis, synthesis and evaluation.) in teaching learning process. The course and curriculum have been designed in a way to ensure innovative techniques in Learning.

Experiential learning-

The College ensures experiential learning to the students undertaking field projects, practical works, Study Tours, field Survey, internships. The Students of Science stream has to undergo practical work,

which is conducted by the departments as a part of internal assessment of the students. The departments of geography conduct field surveys for the students and practical work. All the students are assigned in-house and field projects in the VI semester at graduate level and IV semester at Post graduate level.

Research projects are assigned to the Students of Bio- technology, Bio-chemistry, Micro biology, BCA, M.Sc. (CS), and BBA that they have to complete as a part of the curriculum and Assessment of Semester examination. Collaboration and linkage of renowned agencies, laboratories and companies are ensured in process and the students complete the dissertation in their collaboration. The Experiential learning facilitates the students to learn by experience and develop capacity of self-assessment, evaluation, analysis thus enhancing creativity and capability of research. The students have the opportunity **hands-on training and practice of learning by doing** in the process of submission of their Research Project. M. Phil Students have to undertake dissertation and write literature review as a part of semester examination.

Participatory learning is ensured by assignments and Seminars to the Students at UG and PG level. It is a part of the internal assessment of the college at UG and PG level. A few initiatives for Participatory such as- Peer -learning, Debates, group discussion, case studies, field survey are mandatorily applied by the teachers in teaching-learning process. Assignments are assigned in all the programs/ courses thus to develop the analytical and understanding capability of the students. Case studies and community surveys are also conducted by the students of social science departments during the preparation of seminars. Department of Sociology, MSW, history and Political science assign the topic to the students that involves field survey and case studies. Participatory learning action and participatory rural appraisal is widely used by the research students of M. phil and Ph.D. to collect the data regarding the problems undertaken by them for research activity.

Problem solving techniques is one of the methods applied by the teachers in the institution. There is a broad space open for the students of M.Phil, Ph.D. and others undertaking Project/internship/dissertation in application of problem-solving techniques in project work, dissertation assignments and research activities. There is opportunity of research, analysis, decision making, creativity, brainstorming. Research methodology is taught a part of curriculum to the students of in all disciplines in learning process. Thus, the students are trained to find solution to an open-ended problem. Identification of the problem, collection of data, Data analysis, generalization and finding solution of the problems are a part of the curriculum of research methodology in the Curriculum.

The institution adopts effective Mentor-Mentee Schemes to address academics and student-psychological issues

Response:

The College encourages the teachers in application of latest technologies to ensure effective and innovative teaching-learning practices. The Faculty members apply innovative learning technology to make learning more awarding. In conformity with NEP 2020 the Institution integrates ICT in Learning. The teachers are motivated to use ICT enabled tools such as ppt, youtube lectures, smartphones, e-content, e- resources, e-texts to facilitate better learning of the students. The College has 25 master classrooms, 25 lecture rooms with ICT enabled facilities such as Projectors and Motorized screens, 02 ICT enabled seminar halls with the capacity of 300 students. The College organized to facilitate training for the faculty members enable them to use the devices at their convenience to ensure effective delivery of the contents in the class room. The learning is thus made more efficient and interactive. The College has a language lab in the department of English, 02 class rooms equipped with k-yan facility, 06 computer labs to enable use of ICT in effective teaching and Learning.

The College has it's own you-tube platform. The teachers have prepared youtube lectures and displayed on the institutional website to facilitate the students download and access the content. A few faculty members of the college have been in the e-content development team of the and have contributed to the development of e-contents initiated by the Department of higher education. The e-content developed are available on the LMS e-shiksha of Department of Higher education. The college has a functional website. You tube lectures, PPT's, and e contents are uploaded on the institutional website to ensure access of the students to innovative contents.

Faculty members prepare PPT's of their lectures and share the contents with the students to ensure easy access of learning material to them. E-contents are shared to the students for their smooth learning. The College motivates and has organized FDP's on e-content development and on-line learning to motivate the faculty member to ensure effective use of ICT in Teaching-Learning Process.

The College is a local Chapter of SWAYAM and the students are motivated to get registered on SWAYAM portal in value added or certificate courses. A few students have joined SWAYAM and successfully obtained distinctions of gold and silver in their attempts. The faculty members access, e-resources, e-journals, e-books, on line portals such as IGNOU, e-gyankosh, e-PG pathshala, e-granthalay, INFLIBNET to get innovative on-line contents of teaching and also motivate students to access on-line resources to get the innovative contents of learning.

During COVID- 19 the teachers used on line modes of teaching and they are at liberty to use on-line modes of teaching to ensure inclusion of the students who for any reasons are not regular in the class rooms. On-line student-centric lectures are organized for the students. On-line quizzes have been organized by the faculty members to integrate use of ICT into Learning. Academic Calendar-

The College Prepares and adheres to the academic calendar and teaching plans of the Institution in conformity with the annual academic calendar issued by the department of higher education at the commencement of every session. In Compliance to the academic calendar issued by the Department of Higher education, Government of Madhya Pradesh. The College frames it's own academic calendar and plans all the academic activities to be conducted and accomplished in period of the semester and plans.

Institutional Academic Calendar-

The College runs in semester system and accordingly plans all the scholarly and beyond scholarly activities semester wise well before the commencement of the academic session. A comprehensive strategy and plan to accomplish the academic activities and beyond academic activities is prepared before the commencement of the academic session. In the Comprehensive institutional academic calendar detailed description of all the scholarly and beyond scholarly activities are mentioned such as- the schedule of the procedure of admission, post-admission initiative viz; Zero classes, induction programs, commencement of the regular classes, organization of sports activities, youth festival, cultural activities, allotment of topics of seminars/ assignments, projects, time schedule for submission of assignments, seminars and projects, tentative schedules of semester examination, practical examination, valuation, declaration of results and semester break etc.

Departmental academic Calendar

The college ensures the compliance of all the academic activities in each semester according to the plans specified in the calendar. The various academic departments prepare their own academic plan semester wise in conformity with the academic calendar of the college and ensure timely accomplishment of all the academic activities accordingly. The annual calendar prepared by the academic departments specifies schedules of all the activities to be conducted by the department including schedules of teaching, completion of the courses, Schedules of CCE to be conducted in each semester, submission of Assignments by the students.

The Teaching Diary

The faculty members are also expected to fill their day-to-day diary specifying the completion of the courses Scheduled in the annual teaching plan. The teaching faculty of the departments prepare their teaching plan to ensure implementation of academic curriculum and teaching learning initiatives. The annual teaching plan prepared in advance by the faculty should consists of plans of the provision of extra classes if required for completion of the curriculum, classes for tutorials, and also the periods for PH.D. supervision in case of the department is recognized as a research centre. The Faculty of science involving practical work in the curriculum should specify the schedule of practical classes. in-order to ensure effective implementation of teaching plan. The faculty members are expected to get their teaching diary

and also attendance register signed by the concerning heads of the department. Who in turn get it countersigned by the principal. The practice is highly helpful in effective implementation of the curriculum. The departments prepare the detailed time table for implementing the teaching-learning activities and submit it to the principal. Processes/Procedures integrating IT

All the stakeholders' students, the college administration, the faculty members are integrated through the process of e- governance mechanism for smooth functioning of examination process. The College has a policy of examination regulation and procedure, and the entire examination system is conducted accordingly.

IT integration is ensured from the very beginning of the process viz; the declaration of dates of Continuous Internal Assessment and Semester examination. The Dates of CIA are announced on the institutional website. The Continuous internal assessment is held accordingly. Student's profile is updated before the commencement of the semester examination.

Online Updation of Students Profile- The student's profile is updated on-line well before the commencement of Examination. The students are expected to fill up the examination forms on-line with due submission of the examination fee. The admit cards are generated online. The students download their admission cards from the college website.

Notification of the dates of Examination and declaration to declaration of Results-IT resources are effectively implemented in the institution in notification of examination schedule and declaration of result. Examination schedule is notified on the College website open to easy access of the students. They download their admission cards from the college website. Results are declared and published on the Institutional website.

Students are evaluated through Continuous Assessments (CA) by individual departments. Continuous assessments are conducted in every course at the UG and PG Level. All the academic departments are expected to conduct the CIA complying the academic calendar of the Institution and submit the marks list of the CIA for the final computation of results in the confidential section.

Grievance redressal mechanism

The Results are displayed on Institutional website. The students can upload their e-mark sheets and register their grievances in case of any discrepancy in the marks awarded in the papers concerned. The grievances regarding evaluation are promptly resolved and final result is declared in revised format.

The Departments frame the Program outcomes, program specific outcomes and Course learning outcomes after rigorous consultation with all faculty and the stakeholders. Program Outcomes framed reflect the Vision, Mission and Strategies of the College and the UGC guidelines on Graduate Attributes. The program outcomes are framed in conformity with the five core values of NAAC that reflects the academic excellence, research potency, scope of extension activities, cross cutting issues such as professional ethics, environment and sustainability, human values, employability, skill and entrepreneurship. Program out comes and course outcomes of each program and courses are clearly stated and displayed on the institutional website open for access to various stake holders, faculty members.

The Program Specific Outcomes (PSO) are designed by the concerned Departments with their respective vision, mission and scope of the program.

The Course Outcomes (CO) are formulated by the Department in consideration with the faculty members, external experts, alumni, the student representatives, with expected cognitive, affective and psychomotor learning levels. The curricula designed focuses on outcome-based learning integrating to the cross-cutting issues, global and local relevance.

The suggestions of the alumni and other stakeholders are acknowledged and given weightage while framing the PSO's, and CLO's. The program outcomes are publicized, propagated through different methods specified as under-

PSO's and CLO's are discussed in the meeting of 'Board of Studies' that is held every year before the

commencement of every session. All the teaching departments prepare the program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course learning outcomes of the respective programs and courses opted by the departments well before convening the meeting of Board of studies. Program Specific outcomes and course learning outcomes are discussed in the meeting along with the review of the curriculum framed. All the faculty members of the department participate in the meeting to discuss the curriculum and course outcomes. The minutes and decisions taken in the Board of studies are subject to approval by Academic Council. Hard copies of the PO's, PSO's and CLO's are available in the departments for the faculty members. The course outcomes are displayed on the website which is open for access to all the students as well as faculty members.

Government Thakur Ranmat Singh College Rewa is a recognised Centre of Research in 12 Disciplines affiliated to Awadhesh Pratap Singh University Rewa (M.P.). More than 200 research scholars are enrolled in various Academic departments of the College viz; *Economics, English, Geography, History, Hindi, Library and Information Science, Music, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology, Sanskrit and Commerce*. 43 out of 54 regular Professors posted in the College are research Supervisors, guiding research activity. Prior to Implementation of NEP the Institution has run M. Phil. Program in 13 Disciplines. Consequently, the College has a well-developed Research Facility. For the purpose of operation of Research activity, the college has evolved sound research mechanism as under-

Research Advisory Committee

The College has constituted a research co-ordination cell and a 04 member research advisory committee with the Head of the Institution as its head to take initiatives and decisions facilitating research and to monitor research activities. Pre-Ph.D. submission presentation is organized in the college by RAC before submission of the research reports or thesis for final evaluation. Research Advisory Committee is constituted in the institution for a term of two years. Adequate supports are provided to faculty to undertake research projects on pressing social issues. The committee monitors the overall research activities of the faculty.

Research policy and Professional Code of Ethics

The College has framed it's own research policy and professional code of ethics to promote qualitative research work and avoid possible malpractices in research. Research policy document is uploaded on the Institutional website for access to research scholars and research supervisors. It is also made available to various Departments and Central Library. The Research Supervisors and Scholars involved in research activity have to comply with the research ethics of The Institution.

Plagiarism Check

In-order to avoid malpractices in research and plagiarism in research the Institution ensures plagiarism check before processing the submission of final report or thesis to The University Concerned. The University has authorised the Research Supervisors to use plagiarism software 'Urkund' to check the PhD theses and Dissertations submitted by the M.Phil. Scholars (prior to Implementation of NEP 2020) before submission. The dissertation and thesis work of the scholars are subject to plagiarism check through 'Urkund' before submission for award of degree. The Ethics Committee exists in the College to motivate and promote faculty to comply with the Professional code of Ethics in Research Publications.

Workshops and Conferences on Research Methodology

The College Organizes Workshops and Seminars on Research Methodology To make the Students and Faculty members aware of the Research ethics in Research activities and Publication work. Government Thakur Ranmat Singh College Rewa is a Co-ed Multi-faculty Institution with 12000 enrolled student Strength. The College has adequate infrastructural, physical facilities and learning resources to meet the requirements of the students enrolled.

The main building consists of Offices and cells viz; office of the Principal, Examination and Confidential Cell, Departments of Geography, Sociology, Economics, History, Library and Information Science, Chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Botany with a Botanical garden, and Micro-biology, Fee Section, Scholarship section, 02 computer labs, one ICT Enabled Seminar Hall, 08 master class room, 05 ICT enabled Class rooms and 04 other Class rooms, 02 Computer labs, 07 labs for Science and others, a store Room, and Department of Sports. There is a well-equipped Auditorium with resting capacity of 300 students equipped with ICT facility in the main building.

The (Old) Library Building Consists of 04 Department of English, Commerce, mathematics and URDU 06 ICT enabled Class rooms with motorized screen, 03 smart class rooms, 01 Computer lab, a Language lab in Department of English, 06 other class rooms, Research Scholar's Library and a rare Books Library. The New building Consists of 39 Class Rooms, 01 Computer lab, 07 Departments of Political Science, BBA, Social Work, Hindi Literature, Sanskrit, Music and B. Com. (CA).

The College has endeavored to develop new infrastructural facility in the Premises such as 03 spacious Class rooms funded by RUSA, 06 Spacious Class rooms under World bank Project, newly constructed Academic Bloc. 4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The Government Thakur Ranmat Singh College Rewa has a well-Equipped Library Facility. The library facility is divided into several sections such as Central Library, UGC Library, Rare Boks Library, Research Scholars Library, Book Bank Library and Departmental Library. Central library is equipped with Integrated Library Management Software (ILMS) SOUL 2.0 and e-Granthalaya, streamlining operations like acquisition, cataloguing, and circulation.

The Central Library is fully automated equipped with facilities of database, Soul and e-Grathalaya, e- resources, barcoding, and remote access through NLIST, DELNET, and NDL. The Library facilities remote access to research scholars, enhanced user experience. Constant surveillance with cameras ensures security. All the books are bar-coded and various housekeeping activities of the library, such as data entry, issue and return etc., are done through the software. Classification is done using Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC), and cataloging is done using the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) of SOUL software.

Rare books Section-

The central Library has a good collection of rare books and manuscripts in hard copy and also in digitized form. Research Section of the library contains Ph.D. reports, Dissertations, helpful for Researchers in understanding the literature and research frame work with precious archives for its readers.

e-Granthalaya software:

The Institution has e-Granthalaya software from the session 2021-22. E-Granthalaya is a Digital Platform developed and maintained by NIC, which is a digital initiative for Automation and Networking of Government Libraries under Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology, Government of India.

The current version of the software, e-Granthalaya 4.0, is a Cloud Ready Application with a Web-based data entry solution and a Centralized Database for a cluster of 63 libraries. It utilizes Postgre SQL as the back-end database and is available on NIC National Cloud (Meghraj). Minimal data entry is required, and users can access the application online through working Desktops with Net Connectivity.

The Library subscribes research journals, on line and e-journals through n-list. Digital Library services through MOPAC - Mobile Responsive OPAC and e- Granthalaya Mobile App. e-Granthalaya has following Modules:

The central library houses over 97,000 books and offers wifi access and an e-Library with 50 LAN-connected computers. Internal Audit by the Local auditor (CA)-

Internal audits are Conducted for all types of student's fee including, admission, examination, Janbhagidari Fee, and fee collected from self-finance courses. The Institution ensures transparency and probity in finance. All the income generated are subject to Internal Audit. Internal audit is conducted by the registered Chartered Accountant appointed for the purpose at the Institutional Level. All the heads of receipts and expenditure such as Janbhagidari, Self-finance, Redcross, NSS/Sports, Amalgamated Fund (AF) and Personal deposits (PD) and Grants sanctioned by UGC/RUSA/World Bank/other funding agencies, receipts and expenditure on budget allocated by the Government are subject to Internal Audit. Internal audit is conducted separately for income generated from all the sources and heads.

External Audit

Periodical external audits are Conducted by

- The Office of the Accountant General Madhya Pradesh (MPAG) Gwalior and
- Budget Section, department of Higher Education Bhopal.

For the purpose of external audit, team of auditors are deputed by the Government. All the receipt and expenditure falling on budget allocated by the Government, funds allocated by UGC, RUSA, World bank and others audited by the Internal auditor are subject to further periodical audit by Office of the Accountant General Madhya Pradesh (MPAG) Gwalior.

Team of Auditors from Accountant General's office (MPAG) are deputed to conduct the audit of the receipts and expenditure already audited by the Internal Auditors. The auditors appointed by the Government and MPAG for the purpose of auditing the account of the College audit the receipt and expenditure. The Queries of the auditor's report are resolved by the institution promptly and reported to the Government. Further Audit is conducted by auditor general Gwalior, M.P.

Departmental audit

Departmental External audit is also conducted by the department of Higher Education Bhopal. For the purpose of external audit team of auditors are deputed by the Government. The auditors deputed by the Government conduct integrated audit. The auditors appointed by the Government for the purpose of auditing the account of the College audit not only the receipt and expenditure falling upon the financial resources generated through the Budget allocation of the Government but all the sources other than the budget heads expenditure allocated by the Government as mentioned above.

All The Queries raised during external audits in the auditor's report are resolved by the institution

promptly and reported to the Government.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT

The College ensures better management of solid and liquid waste. The Solid waste generated in the campus is segregated as bio degradable and non- degradable and handed over to auto tippers from Rewa Municipal Corporation as a part of 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and Swachh Rewa mission'. The college has facility of collecting the solid waste before handing it over to auto tippers of municipality. All the Departments, laboratories, and Classrooms are provided with dustbins for dry wastage disposal. Segregation of the waste into dry and wet waste is done through the separately allotted dustbins at strategic locations in the college.

Vermicompost Unit is established in the botanical garden of department of Botany The students of the department actively involve themselves to run this unit. The organic waste material is collected from the

college campus by the students to deposit it in the vermicompost tank. The students are trained and motivated in the practice of vermicomposting. Value aided course of 30 hours have been conducted by Botany Department on vermicomposting. Using cow dung, Earthworms the soil mixture is made with appropriate proportions. With the help of students this mixture is installed in the tank and watered properly for 4-8 weeks. The Compost thus prepared is used in the campus garden.

LIQUID WASTE MANAGEMENT

Hazardous wastes like chemicals are disposed of carefully keeping in view they do not adversely affect the environment. The harmful chemical and solid wastes are collected from the labs and buried under the ground. There is an appropriate plan to minimize the use of hazardous chemicals related experiments. The Dustbins for the collection of Solid waste and Liquid Waste has been set up in the college campus in all the wings.

Waste recycling

The Institution ensures better waste management. The waste collected in the Campus is handed over to auto tippers of District municipal Corporation to get it discharged to land fill stations. The waste of wooden furniture is used somewhere else in best possible way. The Wooden Furniture which cannot be utilized in other way is sold. The Paper waste and waste produced from the Garden such as leaves are used in compost pits to recycle it as manure for the plans. Plastic waste is handed over to auto tippers recycled.

E-WASTE MANAGEMENT

The College ensures better management of e-Wastes. If the computers and E-devices become worthless due to continuous utilization they are written off by the committee constituted for the purpose. Such wastes are either sold as scrap materials to junk dealers or destroyed.
